Dear Community Members,

As we reflect on another remarkable year at PBS Charlotte, I am filled with immense gratitude for the incredible support from our viewers who choose to "Channel their Curiosity" with us. Thanks to your unwavering commitment, we are honored to break another record for the 10th consecutive year in individual giving, reaching a wonderful 13,336 individual investors.

This year has been particularly special with the launch of several new projects. Our Story Stars preschool literacy program has been a beacon of hope and learning, allowing us to work with over 150 children at University Meadows and Hidden Valley Elementary Schools as well as the Salvation Army. Through a generous grant from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, we have been able to instill a love of readina in students from Title I schools, fostering a brighter future for our young learners. We distributed over 5,000 books to help these children build their own personal libraries.

We also introduced a new local program, Unspun,

hosted by former North Carolina Governor Pat McCrory. We are the only PBS station in the country to have a former governor as talent for a local show. This program provides our audience with an insider's view of what politicians are often thinking but not saying. We take the "spin" out of politics and help audiences see how they will be impacted by the issues. Since its launch last spring, Unspun has delved into critical issues such as social security, the economy, and the election cycle, offering valuable insights to our viewers.

Our reach continues to expand as we connect with new audiences across various online platforms. From traditional broadcast viewers to those streaming our content and engaging with us digitally, we are thrilled to reach an average monthly audience of over 425,000 families. This arowth is a testament to our commitment to delivering auality content that resonates with our diverse audience both young and young at heart.

We were delighted to host nearly 550 community members for behind-thescenes station tours, giving the public a closer look at their public television station. Additionally, our local fundraising lecture with beloved PBS travel expert Rick Steves was a resounding success. His impactful presentation not only shared little-known travel tips but also highlighted how travel brings cultures together, leaving a lasting impression on all who attended.

Every year, our small but devoted team strives to deliver insightful local awardwinning content through our five weekly shows that educate, inspire, and entertain. We are deeply arateful to our great region partnering with us to make an even bigger impact next year. Community service remains our north star, auiding us in all that we do. Thank you for your continued support and for being an integral part of our PBS Charlotte family.



Additionally, the provision of tablets loaded with PBS games designed to hone computational thinking skills ensured that learning remained interactive and engaging. This comprehensive approach catered to diverse learning styles and preferences, ensuring that every child had the opportunity to participate and learn. The impact of PBS Charlotte's involvement extended beyond the event itself, with 27 new families signing up for our monthly education newsletter.

FAMILY & COMMUNITY WORKSHOPS



PBS Charlotte's family and community learning workshops have become a cornerstone for families eager to engage in their children's education. Drawing on resources from the new PBS KIDS show Work It Out Wombats. these workshops offered a dynamic platform for both parents and children to explore computational thinking. In February, the inauaural series of workshops kicked off with three sessions tailored to different facets of computational thinking.

The first, Step It Out, emphasized the importance of following and creating step-by-step instructions to solve problems—a fundamental skill in computational thinking. The second and third sessions focused on Cause and Effect–how we can anticipate the outcome of actions, and Finding What Matters– learning how symbols can represent everyday objects.

Following the success of the initial workshops, PBS Charlotte continued to expand its offerings, hosting two more sessions in late April and early May. These workshops delved into The Design Process, another critical computational thinking skill involving creation, testing, and improvement of projects. Each workshop began with a meal, fostering connections among participants, followed by the screening of an episode of Work It Out Wombats, providing a thematic foundation for the ensuing discussions and activities.

The structure of the workshops ensured active participation from both children and adults. With 24 families made up of 46 children and 27 adults, the workshops fostered a sense of community while equipping participants with practical skills. Notably, 155 books were distributed to further support learning at home. Pre and postworkshop surveys revealed a significant boost in parental confidence, with 87.5% reporting increased assurance in their ability to teach and support computational thinking skills in their children—a testament to the workshops' effectiveness in empowering families.

3D PROJECT - DREAMERS, DOERS, DESTINY CELEBRATING EIGHT YEARS OF EMPOWERING FUTURES



PBS Charlotte is proud to celebrate the eighth year of our 3D Project: Dreamers, Doers, Destiny, a sevenweek career pathways and leadership economic mobility program. This year, we are honored to have graduated our 750th student, marking a significant milestone in our commitment to empowering young minds.

The 3D Project provides students with the opportunity to engage in interactive conversations about their future aspirations. Students are exposed to over 20 career videos showcasina professions that do not require a four-year degree. These careers range from those needing just a few weeks of certification after high school to those requiring an associate degree. This exposure broadens their horizons and helps them see the diverse opportunities

available to them.

A highlight of the program is when students visit our television station to record their own "I Have a Dream" speeches. This powerful experience allows them to articulate their dreams and recognize the broader impact of their aspirations.

They are encouraged to consider who will benefit from their dreams coming true, beyond themselves. This realization fuels their determination to overcome challenges and pursue their goals, knowing that their success can positively impact others as auto mechanics, registered nurses, IT specialists, EMTs, and more. One inspiring example is Selena Cortez, a 2018 graduate of the program. With the support of PBS Charlotte staff, Selena received a scholarship to attend Central Piedmont, becoming the first in her family to graduate college. Today, she is a successful FMT and returns to the program to share her story with current students. "I wouldn't be an EMT makina good money today if it weren't for PBS Charlotte," Selena says, highlighting the transformative impact of the 3D Project.

As we look back on eight years of the 3D Project, we are filled with pride and gratitude for the students, staff, and supporters who have made this journey possible. Together, we continue to inspire and equip the next generation of dreamers.
